Members of the International Council of Advisors are among AUW's most active and committed volunteers who have a broad range of experience in academia, business, government, fundraising, and international development. Members of the International Council of Advisors provide advice and recommendations to the University's senior academic and administrative leadership, serve as ambassadors and advocates for AUW in order to raise awareness and support for the University, participate in occasional meetings organized by AUW to learn about the University's work, to meet its leaders, and to exchange information and ideas, and assist the University in developing networks and contacts with other prominent individuals and institutions.



Bruce Alberts is a prominent biochemist with a strong commitment to the improvement of science education. He began service as Editor-in-Chief of *Science* in 2008. Mr. Alberts is also a professor in the Department of Biochemistry and Biophysics at the University of California, San Francisco, a position he returned to in 2005 after serving two six-year terms as

president of the National Academy of Sciences in Washington, D.C. Widely recognized for his work in the fields of biochemistry and molecular biology, Mr. Alberts has earned many honors and awards, including 15 honorary degrees. He currently serves on the advisory boards of more than 25 non-profit institutions, including the Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation and the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory.



Luisa Brunori is a professor of psychology at the University of Bologna in Italy and the Director and Founder of the Interdepartmental Centre for Research and Group Intervention (CIRIG). She also serves as a professor of theory and techniques of group dynamics, and specializes in clinical psychology and psychiatry.



Andrea Gavosto is the Director of the Giovanni Agnelli Foundation, a non-profit organization that conducts research in the fields of human and social sciences. He earned a degree in economics from the University of Turin and specialized in economics at the London School of Economics. Prior to his involvement with the Giovanni Agnelli Foundation, he worked for the Research Centres of Banca

d'Italia, Fiat, and Confindustria, and was the Chief Economist of Telecom Italia from 2002 to 2007.



Debora de Hoyos is a partner at Mayer Brown in Chicago, where she was earlier Managing Partner.



Mickey Kantor serves as a partner at Mayer Brown in Washington D.C. Prior to joining Mayer Brown, Mr. Kantor was the United States Secretary of Commerce (1996-1997) and the United States Trade Representative (1993-1996).



Young Joon ("YJ") Kim is a partner in the international law firm of Milbank, Tweed, Hadley & McCloy LLP in Hong Kong. He currently serves as Co-President of the Harvard Club of Hong Kong, as Regional Director-Asia for Harvard Alumni Association, and on the Dean's Advisory Council for the Harvard Law School Association.



Lauren Kahea Moriarty is a committed community leader, youth mentor, and former United States Ambassador. From 1978 to 2007, she worked as a U.S. diplomat. Her postings included assignments in Bangkok, Islamabad, Taipei, Beijing, Honolulu, and Washington, D.C. When she was appointed U.S. Ambassador for Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC),

Ambassador Moriarty became the first U.S. ambassador of native Hawaiian heritage. She helped shape Washington policy on multilateral aid and international finance, advanced U.S. interests on transportation and health, and provided critical assistance in negotiations on the accessions of China and Taiwan to the World Trade Organization. Active all her life in mentoring and teaching, Ambassador Moriarty has served on school boards and taught junior high and high school students. For her work in developing U.S. diplomats, she received the U.S. Department of State's top award for leadership and mentoring.



Richard Saller is currently the Dean of the School of Humanities and Sciences at Stanford University. He came to this position after serving as Provost of the University of Chicago (2002-2006), and Dean of the Social Sciences Division at Chicago for eight years (1994-2001). He was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2005. His

research has concentrated on Roman social and economic history, in particular patronage relations, the family, and the imperial economy. He uses literary, legal, and epigraphic materials to investigate issues of social hierarchy, gender distinctions, and economic production with the aid of current social science theory. His BA in history and Greek was earned at the University of Illinois (1974) and his doctorate at the University of Cambridge (1978).



Catharine R. Stimpson was appointed Dean of New York University's (NYU) Graduate School of Arts and Science in 1998 and is a university professor. Prior to her arrival at NYU, Professor Stimpson was Director of the MacArthur Foundation Fellows Program. She has also served as a professor at Rutgers, where she was Dean of the graduate school and Vice Provost for graduate education from 1986 to 1992. She also is a former chair of the New York State Humanities Council and the National Council for Research on Women, and President of the Modern Language Association. She was the first Director of the Women's Center of Barnard College and of the Institute for Research on Women at Rutgers.
